

WEARING A FACE MASK: INFORMATION FOR PATIENTS



Essential information for inpatients in hospital

Important points

- A surgical face mask should be worn by all patients within the hospital, including moving between departments.
- Wearing a face mask protects you and others around you.
- Clean your hands with hand sanitizer before and after using a face mask.
- Once in place do not touch the face mask, even when communicating.
- Don't move the face mask below your chin to speak or when you are not using it.
- Change your mask regularly, in particular:
 - > when it is damp, soiled or damaged;
 - > before moving to a different area of the hospital;
 - > after eating or drinking.

- 1. Make sure the face mask covers your nose, mouth and chin.
- 2. You do not need to wear a face mask if you are receiving oxygen therapy or are unable to tolerate wearing one.
- 3. You should wear a face mask as much as possible, including when in bed.
- 4. If you are in a single room you should wear a mask whenever anyone enters your room.
- 5. You can remove your face mask when showering, eating/drinking or sleeping.
- 6. Make sure you stay a 2 metre physical distance from others where possible.
