### Anaesthetic information

(Not applicable to scopes)

#### **Local Anaesthetic**

- · You may eat and drink as normal.
- This is a type of medication used to numb areas of the body and causes complete loss of sensation.
- It normally involves the skin and the tissues underneath the skins surface.
- It only takes a few minutes to lose feeling in the area where the local anaesthetic is given.
- It is usually used for minor procedures.
- You will not feel any pain after you have been given the local anaesthetic.
- Any risks/side effects will be explained to you before having the local anaesthetic.

#### **General Anaesthetic**

- You must not eat for six hours before your procedure (unless told otherwise).
- This is medication used to cause loss of consciousness.
- You will be unaware of surgery and unable to feel pain as your brain does not respond to pain signals.
- · You will not see, hear or feel anything.
- It is used for greater patient safety and comfort in certain surgical procedures.
- It is usually used for longer operations.
- You will meet your anaesthetist before surgery. They will answer any questions and explain the plan for the procedure.
- The anaesthetist will discuss the risks, benefits and common side effects.
- Throughout the surgery your vital signs will be continuously monitored to ensure you are receiving enough oxygen and are kept asleep for the entire procedure.

## Introduction

This leaflet is to give you information about what you need to know and do before coming to the Day Surgery Unit, at Western Isles Hospital.

- Please confirm your appointment by telephoning the number stated on the front of the admission letter.
- The Day Surgical Unit is based on the third floor in the Western Isles Hospital.
- As you enter the Day Surgical Unit make your way to the Nurses Station, located halfway down the Day Surgical Unit corridor.
- Within the Unit, there is also a waiting room available, which is used before and after operations, as necessary.
- If you become ill or cannot make the appointment, please contact the Day Surgery Unit on (01851) 704704 ext. 2424 as soon as possible, so that another patient may benefit.
- If you have any queries about your procedure please contact the Day Surgery Unit on (01851) 704704 ext. 2424 between 8am-5pm. Staff will be more than happy to help.

# Preparing for your appointment

- You should not eat or drink for six hours before your appointment (unless told otherwise).
- Please bathe/shower on the morning of your appointment.
- Please do not shave the surgical area prior to admission.
- Please bring a list of medications and also any medication that you will be due to take in their original containers/packaging.
- Try not to smoke for 12 hours before your appointment.
- Please remove piercings and jewellery except for your wedding ring which will be taped.
- Please remove all make-up and nail varnish, as these are not permitted in Theatre.
- Please do not bring jewellery or valuables with you to hospital.
- It is advisable to bring a dressing gown and slippers to wear while you are waiting for your appointment.
- Please bring a book or something to read, as you may be waiting some time before or after your appointment.
- Public WiFi is available if you wish to bring a tablet/laptop.

## What will happen on the day?

- On arrival to the Day Surgery Unit you will be greeted by the nurses who will look after you throughout your stay.
- On admission you will find that you are asked the same question more than once.
   This is part of our careful checking system.
- The nurses will help prepare you for Theatre and provide a hospital gown.
- The surgeon and anaesthetist will see you before your surgery and ask you to sign a consent form, if not already completed.
- There will be some waiting time either before or after your operation, depending on where you are placed on the list.
- About one hour after your operation most patients are ready to enjoy a cup of tea/ coffee and toast.
- You will be made comfortable and have adequate pain control (if required) before you are discharged.
- Before leaving the ward any post-operative care will be discussed with you.
- If you have had a sedation or general anaesthestic you must make arrangements for someone to stay with you overnight and arrange transport to take you home. This is because those who have had a sedation or general anaesthetic are not legally allowed to drive for a minimum of 24 hours.
